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

- Once prepared, guests are escorted by staff to the water-level shell doors on Deck 2 to step directly from the ship into Zodiacs® and kayaks
- Guests in each group can be deployed in Zodiacs® and off to their adventures within minutes



Two six-person submarines offer unique and unforgettable undersea experiences to Seabourn Venture guests. Piloted by experienced Expedition Team submariners, these engineering marvels are capable of transporting guests beneath the surface, offering breathtaking views of everything from the surreal subsea realms beneath Antarctic ice to plunging underwater cliffs in fjords and reef walls teeming with life beneath clear, tropical seas. These exceptionally rare experiences are available for an additional charge in select destinations.

- Two technologically advanced submarines built by U-Boat Worx B.V. (The Netherlands)
- Interiors are luxuriously furnished with custom embroidered upholstery, dual air conditioning systems, Bluetooth stereo sound and a Champagne cooler
- Two transparent spheres with seating for three guests each
- Seating platforms swivel 280 degrees for easy viewing on all sides
- Capable of multiple dives a day to depths up to 300 m/1,000 feet at 3 knots speed
- Powerful exterior lights reveal full color range, highlight a fascinating underwater world
- HD videocam systems record inside and outside action for later projection and souvenirs
- A six-function remote arm can be used to manipulate or retrieve objects outside the sub



EQUIPPED FOR EXPLORATION: ZODIACS® & KAYAKS

Zodiacs® are the workhorses of our expeditions. These amazing watercraft revolutionized cruising to extraordinary destinations. They are our means for landing on trackless beaches, desert isles and far-flung icy shores where no docks or other facilities exist. They are magic carpets that carry us on scenic passages up towering fjords, among breaching whales and stately icebergs, and on forays into jungle-draped channels bright with nesting birds. They deliver us to untouched coral reefs, bobbing patiently as we snorkel or dive to our heart's content. Our fleet of 24 Zodiacs® can all gather beside the water-level shell doors on either side of Seabourn Venture, allowing us the option to take all guests on a complimentary Zodiac® tour at once, should conditions dictate a restricted time frame.

Double Sea Kayaks glide silently along shorelines, moving with silken grace as we approach wildlife at eye-level, finding them curious and unafraid. Noiseless, they allow us to enjoy the snaps of brash ice in a glacier's meltwater, the musical sound of a waterfall and the ceaseless breath of breeze through old-growth forest. We can navigate tangled mangrove thickets teeming with life above and below the water, and slide over multicolored tropical coral gardens. Escorted by a masterful member of our Expedition Team, they offer an appealing option available for an additional charge in many destinations.







HIGHLIGHT: THE BIRDS OF FAIR ISLE. Remote Fair Isle's Bird Observatory can claim 350 species and 27 UK first records. Rare Siberian passerines and an endemic wren are outnumbered by the teeming seabird colonies on its cliffs.




ARCTIC EXPEDITIONS

Your Expedition Team generously imparts their formidable knowledge daily, both on board and ashore, but it is your sensory experience - the pure pleasure of being there - that will shine in your memory and last a lifetime.

11 DAYS | TROMSØ TO OSLO | JUL 27, 2021 V147 | SEABOURN VENTURE

DAY 0 | TROMSØ

Arrive in Norway's 'Capital of the North' and transfer from the airport to the pier to embark Seabourn Venture for your Arctic expedition.

DAY 1 | STORSTAPPEN ISLAND & HORNVIKA

Experience Nature's sheer, Arctic summer extravagance on a Zodiac® cruise of **Storstappen Island's** teeming seabird cliffs. Then climb a flower-decked, stair-step path to the iconic North Cape, or choose to go by road. Later, toast the Cape and each other as you cruise by again at day's end, en route to more Arctic adventures.

DAY 2 | NORWEGIAN SEA

Get to know Seabourn Venture and your fellow adventurers as you cruise the **Norwegian Sea**, and meet the fascinating, experienced and accomplished members of your Expedition Team, both in formal briefings and presentations in the Discovery Center and in more casual conversations around the ship.

DAY 3 | BEAR ISLAND (BJØRNØYA)

The towering, fortress-like cliffs and seastacks of **Bear Island (Bjørnøya)** greet you

this morning with the sights and sounds of uncountable circling and nesting seabirds and intriguing sea caves and channels to explore by Zodiac[®]. Later move to the flat, lunar landscape nearer the Herwighamna weather station to meet its isolated crew.

DAYS 4-10 | THE SVALBARD EXPERIENCE

The islands of Svalbard are eloquent evidence of nature's industry, scored and corrugated by glaciers that cover 60 percent of their mass. Stony, sentinel peaks soar above deeply carved fjords and sparkling bays. In summer, tundra vegetation thrives under the Midnight Sun. Migratory birds in their millions arrive to nest, breed and nurture their young on steep, striated cliffs, shingle beaches and tundra meadows. Elaborately antlered reindeer graze the slopes. Arctic foxes and predatory gulls haunt the nursery edges. Seals and walruses haul out to join the breeding season, and polar bears patrol the rocky shorelines and floating ice, while whales roll and breach and feed offshore. Here and there, testaments to past human endeavors endure: whalebones and weathered trypots from medieval whaling stations; the wind-sanded timbers of an expedition's launching site; a hut where someone whiled away a long-ago, dark winter. Riding in Zodiacs® and paddling kayaks,



DAY 11 | LONGYEARBYEN & OSLO



Longyearbyen was named after the American industrialist John Longyear, whose Arctic Coal Company initiated coal mining here in 1906. The seat of the Governor of Svalbard is located on a small tributary of the large Isfjorden. The town's 2,100 inhabitants live in one of world's most northerly settlements, employed in a combination of coal mining, education and tourism. Disembark at Svalbard's capital and transfer to the airport for your included flight to Oslo, Norway.

HIGHLIGHT: WALRUSSES are the Arctic's largest pinnipeds, reaching 11 feet in length and 3,700 pounds. With long, curved tusks and prominent bristly whiskers, they are unmistakable when 'hauled out' on shore in communal heaps to maintain heat. They feed by scooping up molluscs, crushing the shells against their bodies, and eating the meat. We appreciate them from a distance, respecting their shy, suspicious nature.

SPECTACULAR SVALBARD & GREENLAND

15 DAYS | OSLO TO REYKJAVÍK | AUG 6, 2021 V148 | SEABOURN VENTURE

DAY 0 | OSLO

Arrive in Norway's picturesque capital and transfer to the Radisson Blu Oslo for an overnight stay.

DAY 1 | LONGYEARBYEN



Transfer to Oslo's airport for your included flight to Longyearbyen, located on a small tributary of the large Isfjorden on the Island of Spitsbergen. The town's extreme isolation and proximity to wildlife require unique laws. Embark Seabourn Venture to begin your Arctic adventure.

DAYS 2-6 | THE SVALBARD **EXPERIENCE**

The islands of Svalbard are visually stunning. With no forest cover, their geological bones loom bare under the sky. Snow-dusted peaks resembling layered stone wedding cakes soar above deeply carved fjords and sparkling bays. In summer, tundra vegetation thrives under the Midnight Sun. Migratory birds in their millions crowd the skies, to nest, breed and nurture their young on steep, striated cliffs, shingle beaches and tundra meadows. Elaborately antiered reindeer graze the slopes. Arctic foxes and predatory gulls haunt the nursery edges. Seals and walruses haul out to join the breeding season, and polar bears patrol the rocky shorelines and floating ice, while whales roll and breach and feed offshore. Testaments to past human endeavors include whalebones and weathered trypots from medieval whaling stations; the wind-sanded timbers of an expedition's launching site; a hut where someone whiled away a long-ago, dark winter. Riding in Zodiacs® and paddling kayaks, observing from the decks and trekking on the islands themselves, we will experience and explore this isolated, unspoiled and breathtakingly beautiful place, as it revels in the endless days of its short, exuberant summer. The precise daily itinerary will be planned by your Expedition Leader and Captain based on sea and ice conditions and wildlife concentrations.

DAYS 7-8 | GREENLAND SEA

After your days of energetic exploration, luxuriate in the many pleasures of Seabourn Venture during leisurely cruising in the Greenland Sea. Your Expedition Team members answer questions, recount tales and point out highlights on deck and in lounges, and also share fascinating presentations in the Discovery Center, in anticipation of your further adventures in Greenland.

DAY 9 | JAN MAYEN ISLAND

Isolated in the Arctic Ocean, seldom-visited Jan Mayen Island is volcanic in origin, consisting of two peaks. Its larger end, Beerenberg peak, is covered with an ice cap and multiple glaciers. Landing is by Zodiacs® only and requires permission. There is a small scientific and military presence, but the island is an Important Bird Area reserve with huge breeding populations of northern fulmars, little auks, and both thick-billed and black quillemots.

DAY 10 | DENMARK STRAIT

Cruise the **Denmark Strait**, marking the geographic divide between the Greenland Sea and the North Atlantic. It forms a shallow barrier known as a 'sill,' impeding water movement and separating the two seas. At the south end of the strait, sea depths plummet to 11,500 feet (3,500m), creating the Denmark Strait Cataract, where water descends 7,500 feet (2,300m) to form the highest undersea waterfall in existence.

DAY 11 | HEKLA HVAN & RØDE Ø

Stone cairns from an 1891 expedition mark Hekla Havn in East Greenland's Scoresby Sound. Remnants of its buildings are also left. Tall, stratified ridges encircle the fjord and striking patterns in the rocks enchant photographers, as do Inuit tent circles and standing stones. The Rødefjord is a wonderland of geological color, with cliffs of 300 million-year-old red sandstone standing against the blue Greenlandic sky. The fjord is filled with shining white icebergs, many of which are stranded. On Røde Island is a small sea cave navigable by Zodiacs®, and a picturesque columnar basalt formation called the 'pile of firewood.' Conditions permitting, we may land on the island or explore the shores in kayaks.

DAY 12 | BEAR ISLANDS & SYDKAP

Waterways surrounding the low, glaciated Bear Islands are dotted with icebergs and ringed by distant snowcapped ranges. Warm currents attract walruses, seals, and beluga and bowhead whales. Glaciers planed the slopes to reveal twisted and rippled lavers of differently colored rocks. Against Sydkap's breathtaking backdrop of the Stauning Alps, colossal tabular icebergs parade across the fjord. On slopes carpeted in red and yellow autumn tundra, huge solitary boulders known as erratics balance precariously, deposited by melting glaciers. Stone house ruins, whale bones, and muskox skulls tell of settlement by prehistoric hunters from the early Thlish culture.

DAY 13 | ITTOQQORTOORMIIT

Small, isolated **Ittoggortoormiit** is a cluster of buildings painted in bright colors, amid an imposing landscape at the entry to vast Scoresby Sound. True to traditional Greenlandic culture, skins of seals, muskoxen and polar bears hang on racks outside homes. Sled dogs idle in the yards, their wooden sledges propped against the house. Buy Greenlandic stamps in the post office to mail postcards from an unexpected postmark. Or visit the quaint church, its gabled interior painted in white and sky-blue.

DAY 14 | VIGUR

Iceland's remote Westfjords peninsula is a wild land of tall, steep mountains cut by fjords and carpeted in summer with wildflowers. Vigur Island's cliffs filled with nesting birds make it one of Iceland's most renowned areas for birding. The people long ago built special stone walls that attract nesting. After the birds depart, people collect the precious down lining the nests to sell. Busy Arctic foxes patrol the edges of colonies in hope of a meal.

DAY 15 | REYKJAVÍK

Established by Vikings around 870 A.D., **Reykjavík** was the first permanent settlement in Iceland. In 1703 it consisted of a farm and a church and had 69 residents. Today the world's northernmost national capital has evolved into a sophisticated city that is also one of the cleanest, greenest and safest on earth. Here you will disembark Seabourn Venture after your unforgettable Arctic expedition.










REYKJAVÍK, ICELAND



HIGHLIGHT: POLAR BEAR. The apex Arctic predator and the largest land carnivore in the world, and gave the region its name, from the Latin Arctus for bear. They are aggressively opportunistic feeders, roaming ceaselessly for unwary seals. We often see lone males, or mothers with one or two young, either along the shore, swimming or on the sea ice hunting for seals.

LEGEND OF THE ICELANDIC SAGAS

14 DAYS | ROUND-TRIP REYKJAVÍK | AUG 21, 2021 V151 | SEABOURN VENTURE

DAY 0 | REYKJAVÍK

Is the northernmost national capital in the world, and also one of the cleanest, greenest, and safest cities on earth. Colorful rooftops and the elegant spire of Hallgrímskirkja Church dominate the city's skyline, dwarfed by Iceland's dramatic landscape. You will embark Seabourn Venture here to begin an in-depth discovery of Iceland and Greenland's splendors.

DAY 1 | GRUNDARFJØRÐUR

The charming small fishing village of **Grundarfjørður** is renowned for Kirkjufell, one of Iceland's most photographed mountains near two sets of photogenic waterfalls. The town is located in the Snæfellsnes Peninsula and provides easy access to Stykkishólmur, Snæfellsbær and the Snæfellsnes National Park. During the summer, residents build a Viking Village in the center of town and re-enact Viking-era life. The surrounding sea is rich with bird & marine life.

DAY 2 | VIGUR

The remote Westfjords peninsula region in northwest lceland is a steep, wild landscape, sparsely populated due to lack of flat farmland. Its second-largest island, **Vigur**, is a renowned site for viewing nesting birds. Sea cliffs offer a wealth of nesting sites, and Vigur's people long ago constructed unique stone walls to attract eiders, which line their nests with famously soft and durable down. After the birds depart, people collect the down to sell on the global market.

DAY 3 | ITTOQQORTOORMIIT

At the entry to vast Scoresby Sound, the colorful houses of little **Ittoqqortoormiit** are clustered beside the fjord in an imposing landscape. The town reveals a lot about traditional Greenlandic culture. Skins of seals, muskoxen and polar bears dry on racks, and sled dogs await winter leashed in yards as wooden sleds lean against the houses. Purchase Greenlandic stamps and mail postcards in the post office, or visit the quaint church, its gabled interior painted in white and sky-blue.

DAY 4 | HEKLA HVAN & RØDE Ø

Hekla Havn in East Greenland's Scoresby Sound was named for Carl Ryder's 1891-92 expedition ship. Stone cairns and remnants of his buildings still lie between tall, stratified ridges encircling the island's glaciated domes. Striking patterns in the rocks and Inuit tent circles dot the surrounding tundra, dressed in the brilliant reds and yellows of Arctic autumn. Rødefjord's cliffs of 300 million-year-old red sandstone stand out against the sky and an ink-blue fjord filled with shining white, stranded icebergs. On monolithic Røde Island is a small sea cave navigable by Zodiacs®, and a picturesque columnar basalt intrusion called the 'pile of firewood.' We may land here to survey the colorful panorama or explore the shore in kayaks.

DAY 5 | BEAR ISLANDS & SYDKAP

Warm currents attract walruses, seals, beluga and bowhead whales to the low, rocky **Bear Islands** in Scoresby Sound. Broad waterways filled with icebergs are

ringed by distant snowcapped ranges. Glaciers have planed surfaces smooth to reveal twisted and rippled layers of differently colored rocks. At the north end of the sound, **Sydkap** has a breathtaking backdrop of Stauning Alps. Colossal tabular icebergs parade majestically in the fjord, and huge boulders stand solitary and balanced in the tundra, deposited by melting glaciers. The ruins of stone houses, whalebones and muskox skulls tell of a settlement of pre-historic whale hunters from the early Thlish culture.

DAY 6 | KING OSCAR FJORD & ALPEFJORD

King Oscar Fjord cuts deep into Greenland's eastern coast, forming the northern border of the Northeast Greenland National Park, the world's largest. It is up to 16 miles in width, with breathtaking skylines of looming mountains cradling glaciers in their passes. Along with varied wildlife, scenic cruising of the fjord offers impressive geological panoramas. Entire islands are striped like candy canes in striations of colorful limestone and dolomite. Alpefjord, is a narrow, steepwalled tributary leading to a 30-mile (50 km) long glacier. A long tongue of ice blocks half its length, depositing enormous icebergs. Muskoxen are frequently seen here.

DAY 7 | ELLA Ø & BLOMSTER BUGT

Ella Island is wedged at the confluence of five fjords in one of Greenland's most stunning landscapes. Its sole summer occupants are 12 members of the famous Sirius Dog Sled Patrol. Two-man teams of the Danish troopers travel for months at a time in winter. **Blomster Bugt** (Flower Bay) is named for its colorful



flowering tundra shores. The site rewards us with fantastical geologic formations, Great Northern Divers—thought to be the oldest bird species on the planet, arctic foxes hunting quick-footed white arctic hares, frequent grazing muskoxen and an old trappers hut.

DAY 8 | KEJSER FRANZ JOSEPH FJORD

Kaiser Franz Joseph Fjord is one of Greenland's largest, renowned for its exceptionally tall, steep mountains. The Nordfjord branch ends in the great Waltershausen Glacier, the largest flowing from the Greenland Ice Sheet. The Devil's Castle is a looming, reddish mountain with striking lighter-colored diagonal bands. The fjord boasts Greenlandic wildlife including four species of seals, walrus, beluga and narwhals in the sea; and caribou, muskoxen, polar bears, foxes and hares and other small mammals on land. The birds are likewise encyclopedic, from breeding populations of seabirds to gyrfalcons, geese and eider ducks, ptarmigans, snowy owls and ravens.

DAY 9 | NORWEGIAN SEA

We enter the Greenland Sea and cruise southeast towards Iceland. Once we leave the Continental Shelf the bottom rapidly drops to 5,000 feet (1,500 m). When next we meet the rising shelf, we will be in the **Norwegian Sea** off Iceland's east coast. An estimated 110,000 minke whales frequent these northern waters, as well as humpback and sie whales. Orcas and white-beaked dolphins patrol Iceland's coastal waters, and we will also likely see seabirds including puffins, kittiwakes and guillemots.

DAY 10 | AKUREYRI

Nicknamed 'The Capital of the North,' **Akureyri** sits at the southern head of Iceland's longest fjord, Eyjafjörður. Surrounded by snow-streaked mountains, in summer its hills flourish with a profusion of arctic wildflowers. In the city center, the striking, twin-spired Lutheran **Akureyrakirkja** church has lovely, tall stained-glass windows and an impressive pipe organ. It is a cultured city, with a university, numerous galleries, museums, art exhibitions, a botanical garden and theater performances.

DAY 11 | SEYDISFJÖRDUR

Iceland's east coast was the first area settled, and your archaeologist will tell you about ancient Thorrarinstadr, the earliest community yet discovered. Pretty, multicolored **Seydisfjördur** sits at the base of a jawdropping mountain wall beside a fjord with many photogenic waterfalls, a magnet for artists, musicians and other creative types. The early wooden Blue Church was moved three times. Other old buildings date from the 1848 arrival of Norwegian herring fishermen. Nearby Vestdalseyri is a whaling ghost town, and a former farm at Skalanes is a nature and culture center.

DAY 12 | PAPEY

The medieval 'Book of Settlements' mentions 'Vestmenn' (West-Men) inhabiting **Papey Island** and it is named for Irish monks (papar). Its windswept, grassy slopes culminate in a rock formation called the Castle. Sea cliffs encircling the island provide nesting habitat for seabirds. Guillemots occupy them until


mid-summer, while Atlantic puffins linger until mid-September. Seals and eider ducks also appear during their breeding seasons. Today, the island holds a lighthouse, one dwelling, and Iceland's oldest wooden church, built in 1902.

DAY 13 | HEIMAEY

Heimaey in the Westman Islands is visually impressive, surrounded by vertical sea cliffs many hundreds of feet high. It is also home to millions of Atlantic puffins, more nest here than anywhere else on earth. In 1973 volcanic lava nearly engulfed the town. It was stopped from blocking the harbor by pumping immense quantities of cold seawater onto the flow. The Eldheimar Museum focuses on the eruption, while the Sagnheimar Folk Museum recalls events from as long ago as the 17th century, when Barbary pirates took hundreds of its people into slavery in Algeria.

DAY 14 | REYKJAVÍK

Return to **Reykjavík**, the first permanent settlement in Iceland, established by Vikings around 870 A.D. By 1703 it consisted of a farm and a church and had 69 residents. Today you will disembark Seabourn Venture after your unforgettable Arctic expedition.



HIGHLIGHT: ICEBERGS are the largest ice pieces spawned into the sea from tidewater glaciers, in excess of 16 feet (five meters) in diameter. They are mesmerizing to watch, eroded by air and seawater into fantastic shapes that reflect myriad shades of blue and often host resting birds or seals. Most of their bulk is submerged, and they can ground in shallows or score the sea floor as they are driven by wind and currents.

MAJESTIC FJORDS OF GREENLAND

14 DAYS | ROUND-TRIP REYKJAVÍK | SEP 4, 2021 V152 | SEABOURN VENTURE

DAY 0 | REYKJAVÍK

The name **Reykjavík** translates to 'smoky bay,' referencing the geothermal activity of the area. An amphitheater of mountains encircles greater Reykjavík, shaped by glaciers, earthquakes and volcanic activity over eons. In Iceland's capital you will embark Seabourn Venture to begin an in-depth exploration of Greenland's majesty.

DAY 1 | HEIMAEY

The largest of the Westman Islands, **Heimaey**, is off Iceland's southwest coast. Towering sea cliffs host millions of Atlantic puffins, more than anywhere else. Young pufflings flying at night often land in town, where children rescue them. The town was nearly inundated by a lava flow in 1973. The Eldheimar Museum focuses on the eruption. The Sagnheimar Folk Museum covers local history from the 17th century, when Barbary pirates took hundreds of people into slavery in Algeria.

DAY 2 | DENMARK STRAIT

As we cruise the **Denmark Strait** between Iceland and Greenland, get more familiar with the beautiful, hospitable Seabourn Venture and your fellow adventurers and meet the fascinating, experienced and accomplished members of your Expedition Team, both in formal briefings and presentations in the Discovery Center and in more casual conversations around the ship.

DAY 3 | SERMILIK FJORD

Sermilik Fjord culminates in seven large tidewater glaciers feeding stately, photogenic icebergs of all shapes and sizes into the fjord. Surrounded by mountains supporting five more hanging glaciers, it is a breathtaking place to cruise. The towering Schweizerland Alps of King Christian IX Land, crowned by awe-inspiring Mont Forel above Midgard Glacier, are Greenlandic landscape on a truly monumental scale.

DAY 4 | UMIVIK BAY

Nearly 30 miles (50 km) of tidewater glaciers ring **Umivik Bay**, sloping down from the Greenland Ice Sheet to the sea. From here, Fritjof Nansen started his 1888 expedition to cross Greenland over the ice sheet. A six-man team skied and hauled sledges from here to Godthåb (Nuuk). Two Paleo-Eskimo Saqqaq archaeological sites here date to 2500 B.C. Several large islands in the bay, including Uppernattivik, make inviting landing sites.

DAY 5 | SKJOLDUNGEN FJORD

The operatic grandeur of **Skjoldungen Fjord** inspired its name, from mythic Norse royalty. Shining, serpentine rivers of ice flow from nearly vertical peaks, riven by gaping crevasses. Tall serac ice towers are silhouetted against the sky. Treeless slopes are carpeted in colorful dwarf birch, willow and ground-hugging Arctic wildflowers. Thunderous booms signal icebergs

calving into the sea. Scattered remains of Paleo-Eskimo and Inuit dwellings make it an inviting place to explore by Zodiacs® and kayaks.

DAY 6 | PRINCE CHRISTIAN SUND & AAPPILATTOQ

Cruising **Prince Christian Sund**, we will thread narrow channels enfolded by mountains rising sheer to sharp, shattered peaks. The tiny community of **Aappilattoq** is picturesque, with brightly painted houses scattered across a small peninsula of humped granite under a looming, reddish-colored pyramid of stone. The little red town church nestles next to a white-picketed graveyard. From here we continue south, eventually to emerge from the sound only six miles (10 km) from Greenland's southernmost point.

DAY 7 | QAQORTOQ & HVALSEY

The largest city in Southern Greenland, **Qaqortoq** rises steeply above a natural small-boat harbor. Stone & Man is an outdoor art project celebrating Greenlandic culture with sculptures carved from natural rock features. Shops in the town sell traditional arts and crafts and wild-caught furs. At **Hvalsey**, your Expedition Team archaeologist can explain Greenland's most prominent Norse archaeological site, where a wedding in 1408 is the last written record of the Norse in Greenland.

fjords are the result of glaciers flowing over eons from the vast Ice Sheet. The immense weight of these ice rivers grind deep channels through the rock. Most of Greenland's flora and fauna subsist in these breathtaking channels between the ice and the sea. The majestic scale of Greenland's fjords, winding between snowcapped alpine peaks, inspires awe in even the most seasoned travelers.



DAY 8 | NARSAQ & TUGTUTOK

Narsaq's rare deep-water harbor was vital to the medieval Norse Eastern Settlement. Your archaeologist can explain the nearby ruins of Landnåm homestead from AD 1000 and the church of Dyrnaes. Narsaq's redand-white church and cemetery are favorite photo subjects and its museum exhibits include traditional kayak building. **Tugtutoq** Island's wildlife includes a small herd of reindeer, arctic foxes and hares. Its other attractions are geologic and archaeological: intriguing eroded dykes in mixed igneous and sedimentary rock, and ancient Thule and Inuit archaeological sites.

DAY 9 | BRATTAHLÍÐ & ITILLEQ

Erik the Red founded **Brattahlíð** (Qarssiarsuk) in AD 985; and eventually his 'Eastern Settlement' was home to 5,000 Viking settlers. Recently unearthed graves here hold the remains of 144 Viking colonists. Less than 100 people live in Qassiarsuk today, farming sheep just as the Norse did. The oldest church in the Americas is a sod-roofed living history museum. People in **Itilleq**, on a small Davis Strait island with no freshwater source, depend on desalination. They proudly show women's traditional beadwork and their purebred Greenland sled dogs, protected from crossbreeding by regulations banning other breeds north of the Arctic Circle.

DAY 10 | PAAMIUT

Tiny **Paamiut** is remote Greenland at its best. Seal meat and seal skins dry on racks under houses. People have lived here since 1500 BC. Once the Danes arrived, the community traded furs and whale products and earned worldwide fame for traditional soapstone carvings. Fredens Kirke has a multi-gabled façade capped by green roofs, red walls and neat white trim. Scan the skies for white-tailed eagles, known as Nattoralik in Greenlandic. They are plentiful here and local youths name their sports teams for them for good luck.

DAY 11 | NUUK

Traditions and modern influences combine to create Greenland's capital **Nuuk**. Its University of Greenland has 650 students. The National Museum's cultural displays include the astonishing 500-year-old mummies of Thule women and children discovered in a rock cave at Qilakitsoq. The Art Museum's collection primarily features works by traveling European artists. Nuuk Kayak Museum is an impressive collection of traditional sealskin kayaks and indigenous hunting artifacts.

DAY 12 | MANIITSOQ

Maniitsoq means 'uneven place,' describing the rocky knolls and peaks that shape the town's island. Townspeople predictably refer to the town, cut through by small natural canals, as the 'Venice of Greenland.' Their colorful

houses, reflected in the calm water, are far from baroque palaces, but the mountain scenes, breaching humpback whales, smiling, friendly people and the occasional Greenlandic sled-dog provide plenty of photographic opportunities for visitors.

DAY 13 | SISIMIUT

Picturesque **Sisimiut**, on a tranquil fjord north of the Arctic Circle, is 'rough, real and remote.' The area around Greenland's second-largest city has been inhabited for 4,500 years, first by Inuit Saqqaq peoples, then Dorset, and finally Thule people whose descendants form the majority of the current population. Two peaks, Nasaasaaq and Palasip Qaqaa, offer stunning views above brightly colored houses that stand out in contrast to a gray and white landscape. See the traditional Greenlandic peat house and the remains of an 18th-century kayak in the Sisimiut Museum.

DAY 14 | KANGERLUSSUAQ & REYKJAVÍK



Kangerlussuaq lies on a large alluvial plain deposited by the nearby glacial-outflow river. This perfectly flat environment is a rare commodity in Greenland. An airbase constructed here in 1941 served to refuel single-engine military aircraft being ferried to Britain. Disembark Seabourn Venture, cherishing indelible memories of Greenland's unspoiled natural majesty, and transfer to the airport for your included flight back to Reykjavík and onward.

DAY 0 | REYKJAVÍK

Arrive at Iceland's capital and transfer to the Radisson Blu 1919 hotel for an overnight stay.

DAY 1 | KANGERLUSSUAQ



Transfer to the airport for your **included flight to Kangerlussuaq**, Greenland's largest commercial airport. Transfer to the pier to embark Seabourn Venture and begin your Arctic adventure. In 1941, the U.S. Army Air Force constructed an airbase on the flat glacial moraine at **Kangerlussuaq** to refuel aircraft being ferried to Britain. The leading edge of the vast Greenland Ice Sheet looms just a short way along a dirt road outside town.

DAY 2 | SISIMIUT

With 5,600 inhabitants, picturesque **Sisimiut** is the second-largest city in Greenland, with a reputation as a 'rough, remote and real' outdoor adventure hub. The descendants of Inuit Thule people form the majority of the population, whose brightly painted, colorful houses of red, yellow, green and blue stand out against a gray and white landscape. The Sisimiut Museum exhibits a traditional Greenlandic peat house and the remains of an 18th-century kayak.

DAY 3 | ILULISSAT

Ilulissat is Greenlandic for 'icebergs,' and that pretty much says it all. The immense Jacobshavn Glacier produces about ten percent of all icebergs on earth. Ilulissat Icefjord is a UNESCO World Heritage site and icebergs dominate the senses with their austere white beauty, the rumblings and booms of their births, and the subtle scent of fresh melting ice flowing from the

glacier. The polar explorer Knud Rasmussen's house is a museum and an adjacent small art museum has exhibits of art and photography, including indigenous soapstone carvings.

DAY 4 | EQI GLACIER

The grandeur of Greenland's natural landscape is epitomized at the three-mile (5 km)-wide face of **Eqi Glacier**. From the center of the island, it descends steadily to become one of Greenland's most active calving glaciers. Hundreds of bergs shear from its ice cliffs daily and debris, including some the size of an apartment building, fill the bay downstream from the face. The largest events generate tsunami waves that reach 14 feet (4 m) in height. Meltwater below the glacier's tongue attracts seals, seabirds and sometimes whales.

DAY 5 | QILAKITSOQ & UUMMANNAQ

At **Qilakitsoq** in 1972, hunters uncovered human remains identified as eight Thule women and children mummified in the dry, sub-freezing climate over 500 years earlier. Along with clothing made from skins and feathers, they are now displayed in Nuuk. Your archaeologist will also explain other remains from Thule and earlier Dorset cultures. The town of **Uummannaq** sits under a pyramidal peak across the fjord, where a turf hut built for a Danish television show remains 'Santa's home' in the imaginations of Greenlandic and Danish children. Most of Uummannaq Island's inhabitants make their living from halibut fishing.

DAY 6 | UPERNAVIK

The picturesque and colorful town of **Upernavik** in the 100-island Upernavik Archipelago marks the most northerly point of


our Greenland voyage. Officially founded in 1772, it was certainly the site of much earlier Inuit occupation. Greenlandic sled dogs power winter transport here and spend summer days staked out in the yards of homes. The important wooden "qamutiq (sleds)" are stacked awaiting the first late autumn snows. A Viking runestone found in 1824 among three rock cairns on nearby Kingittorsuaq Island is the most northerly Norse artifact discovery to date.

DAY 7 | POND INLET

Cruising ice-speckled Eclipse Sound against the backdrop of tall, glaciated peaks, we approach the Inuit town of Pond Inlet in Canada's Nunavut territory. This is one of the most interesting, culturally rich and welcoming Arctic communities, immersing infrequent visitors into the living modern Inuit culture. Private homes display caribou antlers and skulls. The hides of seals, caribou and possibly polar bears dry in the sun. The local market sells seal, whale and caribou meat and a wide variety of fish. Wooden sleds lying in the yards here are now more often towed by snowmobiles than dogs. Join your Expedition Team to further explore this welcoming Inuit community.

DAY 8 | DUNDAS HARBOUR & CROKER BAY

An abandoned RCMP post marks **Dundas Harbour** as a ghost town where people simply will not live. Established in 1924, it was bought by the Hudson's Bay Company in 1933. Inuits came here from Cape Dorset in 1934, but left 13 years later. Amongst a landscape aglow in Arctic autumn colors is a memento of a few who stayed: the white crosses and picket fence of one of the world's most northerly cemeteries. Nearby are





the 1,000-year-old stone remains of an Inuit settlement. To the west, **Croker Bay** is a fjord flanked by colorful, table-top mountains on Devon Island. The tidewater glacier at its head terminates in a spectacular two-mile (3.5 km)-wide glacial face that calves huge amounts of ice into the bay. Polar bears, seals and a pod of beluga whales may frequently be seen traveling amongst the brash ice.

DAY 9 | BEECHEY ISLAND

Beechey Island entered the annals of Arctic exploration during the search for Arctic explorer Sir John Franklin, whose party vanished in 1846 while seeking the mythic Northwest Passage. Franklin's ships spent the winter of 1845 locked in ice here. Three of his men died and are buried on the island. Few places better embody the description 'barren and lonely' than this. Its treeless, windswept landscape of gravel ridges and wide beaches is interrupted by the small white crosses marking the final resting place of the young Englishmen, so far from home. Should a polar bear with two cubs walk the shoreline, as sometimes happens, it would be a poignant reminder of the resilience of the fascinating creatures adapted to thrive in the Arctic.

DAYS 10-11 | BAFFIN BAY & DAVIS STRAIT

We cruise **Baffin Bay** southward, transiting the North Water, a slightly warmer sea area called a polynya that remains unfrozen throughout the year. This crucial Arctic ecosystem feature sustains a myriad of sea life when most of the surface is locked under ice, providing surface access for walruses and beluga, narwhal and bowhead whales. Polar bears hunt seals along its ice-edge,

and two-thirds of the world's little auks and thick-billed murres are found here. From Baffin Bay, we enter long **Davis Strait**. Narrow and relatively shallow, the strait is notorious for some of the most extreme tidal currents on earth, created when tide changes of up to 60 feet (18 m) funnel through it. In the era of sailing ships, those currents discouraged many potential explorers. Despite this, the skilled Viking seamen crossed from Greenland to Vinland in open-decked longships centuries ago.

DAY 12 | LADY FRANKLIN ISLAND & MONUMENTAL ISLAND

Todav we visit two islands named by fellow Arctic explorer Charles Francis Hall, one as a tribute to British Royal Navy explorer Sir John Franklin's wife and the other in memory of Franklin himself. Lady Franklin Island is truly breathtaking. Tall and imposing, its sheer cliff walls are some of earth's oldest rock, formed some 2.5 to 4 billion years ago. Barren, rocky and exposed, the island is a seasonal home to breeding seabirds, ducks and walrus. With a bit of luck, we may see colorful Atlantic puffins and the small, greyheaded Sabine's gull here. Monumental Island hosts nesting black guillemots on its grev rock shores. Walruses may also be viewed hauled out, often along with calves, at numerous spots around the island. Restless, elusive polar bears patrol the shorelines for any food source and haunt ice-floes in search of seals. A variety of whale species can be seen feeding offshore.


DAYS 13-14 | LABRADOR SEA & NORTH ATLANTIC OCEAN

Some 2,500 icebergs annually drift south through the **Labrador Sea** where we are

sailing in the area known as 'Iceberg Alley.' The largest can run aground on the shallow Labrador Shelf extending from the Canadian coast. Pushed by wind and currents, these create scored areas of sea floor hundreds of miles long, up to hundreds of feet wide and an incredible 60 feet deep. The Labrador Sea supports a healthy population of sei, minke and bottlenose whales, and the drifting sea ice is a breeding ground for seals in early spring. Common seabirds include pomarine jaegers, great shearwaters and northern fulmars. The Grand Banks in the **North Atlantic Ocean** off Newfoundland is one of the most productive fisheries on earth. This underwater plateau deflects the cold, nutrient-rich Labrador Current upward, creating a prolific food source for Atlantic cod, swordfish, haddock and capelin. Scallops and lobster are found here in great abundance. The area's teeming biomass also attracts seabirds including shearwaters, northern gannets, sea ducks and various sea mammals such as seals, dolphins and many species of whales.

DAY 15 | ST. JOHN'S

As Seabourn Venture threads the 'narrows' and enters into the inner harbor of **St. John's**, the capital of Newfoundland, the cultural and traditional flavor of the city quickly becomes apparent. The oldest settlement in North America, it was founded by John Cabot in 1497 and displays architecture befitting one of the first British colonial capitals. Here you will disembark and begin your homeward journey, with vivid memories of the remote and beautiful Arctic realm you have explored.



HIGHLIGHT: NARWHAL. The unmistakable narwhal is a light-colored porpoise living exclusively in the Arctic. Its spiral 'unicorn' tusk is actually an extended tooth up to ten feet in length with millions of nerve endings inside, though no-one has yet determined its use. They are born a blue-grey color, and mature into mottled grey adults up to 20 feet long, gradually lightening to white with age. We believe seeing them is good luck.





SEASONAL MIGRATIONS EXPEDITIONS

THE LATITUDES BETWEEN

As each equinox approaches, we obey an innate seasonal imperative to migrate toward more sunlit regions. Departing the dwindling daylight, we follow a different, fascinating coastline toward the tropics and cross the equatorial line, following the epic passage of Arctic terns between the polar realms. The latitudes between possess their own unique discoveries. The pink sand beaches of Bermuda hint at pleasures waiting in the warm, clear waters and colorful coral reefs of the Caribbean. Mesoamerica's tropical forests teem with exotic birds and animals. along with archaeological legacy, contemporary indigenous traditions, and the man-made marvel of the Panama Canal. The noble Spanish Colonial cities on South America's coast are interspersed with unspoiled reaches of coastal desert, islands white with nesting birds and loud with colonies of sea lions, otters and penguins. Further south, the cordillera of the Andes rise snowcapped just inshore, and the continent's coast is serrated by innumerable forest islands, soaring fjords and shining glaciers.





CHILEAN FJORDS & ANTARCTICA

18 DAYS | SAN ANTONIO (SANTIAGO) TO BUENOS AIRES | NOV 7, 2021 V164 | SEABOURN VENTURE

DAY 0 | SAN ANTONIO

Embark Seabourn Venture at **San Antonio**, Chile, the Pacific port of the Chilean capital, Santiago. A handsome and sophisticated modern city, it treasures many well-preserved reminders of its importance in the Spanish colonial period. Between Santiago and the coast lies the celebrated Maipo Valley wine region producing many of Chile's highly regarded wines.

DAY 1 | PACIFIC OCEAN

During your first day cruising the **Pacific Ocean**, get to know Seabourn Venture, your fellow adventurers and the expert members of your Expedition Team. You'll receive briefings, get acquainted with procedures, and get properly outfitted with clothing and accessories for your expedition. Take time to relish the ultra-luxury lifestyle you'll be enjoying on board.

DAY 2 | RELONCAVÍ SOUND & PUERTO MONTT

Transiting the narrow Canal de Chacao, we turn into the broad **Reloncaví Sound** and thread past forested islands toward **Puerto Montt**, set against a skyline of snowcapped volcanic peaks. It is a gateway to adventures including white-water rafting, trout fishing and hiking in the sequoia-like trees of Alerce Andino National Park. Volcán Osorno looms over Petrohué Falls and Lake Llanquihue, in a landscape of sheep ranches.

DAY 3 | MORALEDA CHANNEL & DARWIN CHANNEL

Awe-inspiring volcanoes line the **Moraleda Channel**, a dramatic waterway dotted with small forested islands. Expedition Team members point out the snowcapped cones of Mt. Cay and Mt. Macca. Beneath their slopes we turn west into the picturesque **Darwin Channel**, where South American sea lions gather and pods of orcas prowl shorelines for the unwary. Where we enter Darwin Bay, humpback whales are sometimes seen.

DAY 4 | BAKER CHANNEL, JORGE MONTT GLACIER & ENGLISH NARROWS

Today we cruise into the mouth of **Baker Channel**, which cuts deep into the margins of the Andes mountain ranges. Surrounded on all sides by snowcapped peaks, the Southern Patagonian Ice Sheet culminates in the **Jorge Montt Glacier**, its wide glacial tongue meeting the ocean in cliffs of ice. Later we transit the gorge-like **English Narrows**. Be on deck as your Captain threads the passage at slack tide to avoid tidal currents, maneuvering through bends and under high, vertical cliffs.

DAY 5 | EYRE FJORD, BRÜGGEN GLACIER & WIDE CHANNEL

The monumental **Brüggen Glacier**, also known as Pio XI Glacier, is the longest southern hemisphere glacier outside

Antarctica, filling the head of **Eyre Fjord** with ice cliffs cut by deep-blue crevasses. Unlike most glaciers, Brüggen has advanced significantly. It is located deep within Chile's huge Bernardo O'Higgins National Park, a refuge for the small Chilean deer known as a huemul. Other wildlife such as Andean condors and marine otters may also be seen. Later cruise the scenic **Wide Channel**.

DAY 6 | PEEL FJORD, CALVO FJORD, EL BRUJO GLACIER & SARMIENTO CHANNEL

We will spend another spectacular day cruising the Chilean Fjords starting with **Peel Fjord** and continuing into **Calvo Fjord**, where we encounter **El Brujo Glacier**, emerging directly into the sea. The exposed rock on its flanks reveals both millennia of scouring and the extent of its recent recession. The indigenous Kawésqar people thrived in this rich but difficult region as much as 6,000 years ago. Finally we pass beneath the steep walls of the Guia Narrows and enter the **Sarmiento Channel**.

DAY 7 | WHITE NARROWS & PUERTO NATALES

The imposing **White Narrows** provides entry to the town of **Puerto Natales**, gateway to the southern Andes, where we will **overnight**. South American sea lions and dolphins are often seen in this area. North of Puerto Natales, the UNESCO World Biosphere Reserve Torres del Paine National Park is home to



hundreds of species of birds and mammals including guanacos, foxes, cougars and huemul. Some 15 birds of prey species including Andean condors breed in the area, as well as ostrich-like rheas.

DAY 8 | PUERTO NATALES & SMYTH CHANNEL

The gentle hills and pampas countryside surrounding **Puerto Natales** supports cattle and sheep ranching. Chilean flamingos dot the quiet bays while eagles and Andean condors soar overhead, especially now in the spring lambing season. The nearby Cueva del Milodón Natural Monument is world-renowned for the mummified remains of an extinct Mylodon giant ground sloth discovered there. In the afternoon, we leave via the **Smyth Channel**, dominated by the looming cone of Mount Burney, the southernmost of Chile's 2.000 volcanoes.

DAYS 9-10 | DRAKE PASSAGE

Your Antarctic voyage truly begins with crossing the **Drake Passage**, infamous for strong currents and winds. In reality, the strait is often a tranquil 'Drake Lake,' barely disturbed by the ship's wake. Your Expedition Team will point out the noticeable change to Antarctic waters and identify ever-present petrels on the waves, albatrosses gliding just above the sea, and the exciting appearance of any whales or dolphins.

DAYS 11-15 | THE ANTARCTIC EXPERIENCE

You will never forget your first sighting of Antarctica and its islands. Regardless of weather conditions, you will find yourself spellbound by the vision of a completely unspoiled landscape of ice, rock and ink-blue sea. For the next five days, your Captain and Expedition Leader plan your itinerary, daily landings, scenic cruising and exploration operations to offer you the widest variety of experiences possible based on conditions and wildlife reports. The numbers and concentrations of wildlife thriving in Antarctica must be seen to be believed. Visits to breeding colonies of different penguin species; sightings of crabeater, Weddell and leopard seals basking on ice or swimming; and watching various species of whales feeding, breaching or passing in review punctuate your every waking hour. 


HIGHLIGHT: CHINSTRAP PENGUINS.

Feisty little chinstraps are named for the distinctive band running from a black 'helmet' atop the head to under the neck. They stand about 30 inches (76 cm) high and make circular nests of (much disputed over) stones. They feed on krill, small fish and squid, often at great distances from shore. They are prey for leopard seals at sea, and their eggs and chicks are vulnerable to air attacks by skuas.





DAYS 0-1 | MANAUS

The largest city on the Amazon and the main port for trade between the vast Amazon Basin and the outside world, Manaus is actually located on the Rio Negro, a few miles from where it meets the Rio Solimões to form the Amazon at the famous "Meeting of the Waters," where the dark-stained waters of the Negro flow alongside the creamy brown Solimões without mixing. Here you will embark Seabourn Venture to remain overnight. Markets along the waterfront hold exotic fish, fruits and other products of the forests. The impressive Teatro Amazonas Italian Renaissance Opera House was constructed of imported materials. The theater hosted world-famous artists at the height of the rubber boom, when the "rubber barons" sent their linens across the Atlantic to Paris for laundering.

DAYS 2-9 | THE AMAZON EXPERIENCE

During your expedition in the Amazon River we will explore varying environments shaped and differentiated by the river itself. These can be divided into three major regions:

Flooded Forests and Blackwater Tributaries – Manaus to Rio Jutaí. The Amazon here is wide, slow and winding, with large areas of seasonally flooded igapó forest flooded by blackwater tributaries and várzea forest with sediments from the Andes carrying floating vegetation and vital nutrients to support an amazing diversity of plant and animal life along the river and floodplains. This region is almost like a seacoast, best explored by Zodiac®, and we will do that on a daily basis, often with multiple departures. People here exploit the forest's natural

products and engage in agricultural and extractive activities in a place rarely seen by the outside world. Exploring this incredible environment with your Expedition Team experts will immerse and help you understand and appreciate it.

The Frontier Amazon – Rio Jutaí to Leticia, Colombia. The banks are closer here and the currents stronger. Our ship passes closer to the forest and we see less frequent evidence of human population. In this more intimate relation to the forest, we will again use the Zodiacs® to probe the shorelines and gain insights from your Expedition Team about the daily activities of the humans and the wildlife living here. The river itself forms the triple borders of Brazil, Colombia and Peru. Isolated, traditional caboclo communities see few visitors. Picturesque, friendly Leticia is a frontier town, hundreds of miles from the nearest Colombian road. The stilt and floating houses along its waterfront reveal how closely its peoples' lives are linked to

The Peruvian Amazon – Leticia to Iquitos, Peru. The Peruvian Amazon is enveloped in an ocean of jungle where the seasons are marked only by the changing river levels and the amount of rainfall during the days. Here we will encounter indigenous populations more commonly along the banks of the river, and discover age-old human traditions surviving unaltered by the outside world. Many unexpected, unforgettable adventures await us as we board our Zodiacs® to explore some of the most remote regions and exotic cultures of the mighty Amazon.

DAY 10 | IQUITOS

Iquitos, Peru is a fascinating place. In the midst of the jungle, we find a major seaport

nearly 2,000 miles (3,200 km) from the sea, the largest city on earth that cannot be reached by road. Here you will disembark Seabourn Venture to begin your homeward journey, with myriad vivid and indelible memories of the Amazon River and the amazing forests, fascinating creatures and the remarkable people along its banks.



GENERAL INFO

SEABOURNSHIELD® GUEST PROTECTION PROGRAM

SeabournShield is available to residents of U.S. and Canada, excluding Quebec and Puerto Rico, and may be added up until final payments. Benefits include reimbursement of losses due to trip cancellation or interruption, trip delay, baggage protection, medical expense coverage and emergency evacuation.

LIMITED MEDICAL FACILITIES IN REMOTE EXPEDITION REGIONS

It is important to know that there are no sophisticated medical facilities available in the remote destinations of your itinerary including intensive care, surgery, advanced imaging and medical specialists. The ship's medical staff of one doctor and two nurses will work to provide initial stabilization and treatment; however, complex medical cases that would normally require transfer to a major medical center may not be available. Where arrangements for medical evacuation can be made from these remote regions, they are entirely dependent on weather conditions, distance from a port and feasibility for medical evacuation to travel the distances required for evacuation.

MOBILITY REQUIREMENTS

Participating fully in the offered activities on this itinerary will require good mobility, generally good health, and the ability to care for oneself in all activities of daily living. Guests who participate on excursions will get in and out of small rubber landing boats (Zodiacs®) with some assistance. You should be capable of walking over uneven and slippery terrain ashore including rocks, snow and ice.

For the safety of all concerned, the Captain shall make the final determination regarding whether or not it is advisable to provide assistance to guests with limited mobility, taking into account all appropriate matters. Please advise the Guest Services Manager on board if you feel you need assistance with going ashore. With advanced notice, additional people and equipment may be able to be arranged to allow for full or modified participation. Equipment used for assistance participating in small rubber landing boat (Zodiac®) excursions is subject to weather, sea conditions and availability at the time of the excursion and its use is at the sole discretion of the Captain and Expedition Leader. If equipment is not available for use, guests with mobility limitations would not be able to leave the ship if it is not docked.

MEDICATION

The ship's medical facility stocks a limited supply of both regular and emergency medications. However, it does not stock every pharmaceutical medication you may be taking. We therefore recommend you bring additional supplies of your regular medications as well as medications you think you may need. Please remember to pack your medications in your hand luggage when traveling to the ship.

MOTION SICKNESS

The seas on expedition cruises can be rougher than some cruisers are accustomed to. If you are prone to or concerned about motion sickness, we recommend the regular use of sea sickness medications. You are encouraged discuss this with your doctor and if necessary to obtain these medications prior to traveling.

MEDICAL INSURANCE INCLUDING EVACUATION COVERAGE

We recommend that guests purchase comprehensive travel insurance including coverage for medical treatment and evacuation. This is in addition to any existing coverage you might have under your own health insurance plan. Due to the remoteness of the itineraries, medical evacuation is more expensive, when it is available. We recommend a plan with a minimum evacuation coverage of \$50,000 per evacuation.

SPECIAL MEDICAL NEEDS

If you will require assistance with any medical needs while on board (e.g., oxygen requirements, medical equipment, and administration of injectable medications or mobility needs), please communicate these needs to our Access and Compliance team as soon as you have booked your reservation via our online Special Requirements Information form or by contacting our Access & Compliance department.

PARTICIPATION IN CERTAIN ACTIVITIES

Unique activities such as sudden cold water immersion ("Polar Bear" plunge) and submarine excursions may be available on your voyage. Please carefully consider your individual risk of participation as this activity is not suitable for guests with certain medical conditions. Please obtain medical clearance from your doctor in advance of the cruise should you wish to consider participating as the ship's doctor is unable to approve or assess your fitness for this event.

MINIMUM AGE TO TRAVEL

Children must be at least six years of age at the time of embarkation in order to sail on Seabourn's Expedition Cruises. Children who participate in excursions must be able to comfortably sit on the pontoon (air chamber) and have their feet touch the floor of the small rubber boat (Zodiac®). They must be able to understand and immediately respond to any orders given by the people in charge, and must be able to walk independently over uneven and slippery terrain ashore including rocks, snow and ice.

For the safety of all concerned, the Captain and Expedition Leader shall make the final determination regarding whether or not children may participate in any excursion, taking into account weather, sea conditions and the difficulty of disembarking at each location visited.
